Plot Synopois

After World War II, song and dance men Bob Wallace and Phil Davis form a successful partnership, eventually becoming top Broadway producers. Bob agrees to take in a nightclub act by the Haynes sisters, Betty and Judy, as a favour, so he thinks, for their brother who served with Bob and Phil in the war. Phil has always been trying to get Bob interested in a girl, usually one in the show, but when he realizes that Bob is smitten with Betty, he arranges to accompany them to their show at a small Vermont Inn. Imagine their surprise when they learn that their old commanding officer, Major General Tom Waverley, is the owner. He's sunk his savings and his pension into the venture but it has yet to snow and it looks like he's on the verge of bankruptcy. A Word from the Director—Max Bullough

If, like me, you were born in the fifties, you probably had parents who told stories about the war years; the experiences of our fathers at the second world war fronts, on land and at sea, were full of tales that captured heroism, loyalty, friendship and duty. Our mothers shared memories of waiting and worrying, welcoming back those who returned and grieving those who didn't. They remembered the romances that were born during the period of conflict and those which were tested by separation. Home and family were at the heart of what had been fought for, the things that kept folk going through the toughest of times.

No wonder then, that when the classic 1954 film was shown on British TV in the early sixties, I fell in love with it. That mixture of nostalgia, comedy and homely love interest may not have been popular with the first critics, but it had proved a massive success at the cinema for its first ten years and was no less well-loved when broadcast frequently by the BBC at Christmas time year after year

Having had a place in my theatre heart for the show for so long, prompted my approach to WMOS to direct it. To be honest though, it is the music in "White Christmas" which was my real motivation. It is stuffed with great numbers by the king of the classic Broadway composers, Irving Berlin. Like many before him and plenty since, he was not averse to robbing his back catalogue for songs in this one. The title song first appeared twelve years before in the film "Holiday Inn", winning the Oscar for best song in 1942. My personal favourite, "Snow"





was a rewrite of a song from "Call me madam". "What can you do with a general" was lifted from an un-produced project called "Stars on My Shoulders". Of course there are also some timeless solos, duets and trios to enjoy; "Love you didn't do right by me" is one of those special moments when the lyrics uncover the internal thoughts and feelings of a main character and reveal a depth to the audience not otherwise obvious; "Sisters" is worth hearing by both pairs, the girls early on and the guys later, tough to decide which one is best. "Falling out of love can be fun" has flashes of Andrews Sisters harmonies as well as sparkling rhymes to chuckle at!

There are plenty of other big numbers for you to enjoy too. "I love a piano" may not seem Christmassy but Berlin did first release it in the month of December (1915!) He knew it was worth a revival here. "Blue skies" wasn't quite so old; he wrote it for the 1926 Rogers and Hart show, "Betsy". What he did change this time was the orchestrations and the vocal settings. The real treasure of tonight's show will be the choral brilliance of his lush chording and crunching harmonies so typical of the period.

Finally, I want to mention the many cameo roles on stage tonight; when I was considering this musical at the early stage of the project, I knew Winchester Musicals and Operatic Society was best placed to bring to life the many quirky comic vignettes an audience will warm to.

Adrian Hickford—Phil Davis



Penny Bullough—Martha








Max Bullough Director
