Rodgers and Hammerstein's first collaboration remains, in many ways, their most innovative, having set the standards and established the rules of musical theatre still followed today.

The high-spirited rivalry between local farmers and cowboys provides a colourful background against which Curly and Laurey play out their love story. Packed with musical numbers renowned the world over, Oklahoma! opened on Broadway on March 31st 1943 and ran for 2,212 performances.

When our society first produced Oklahoma! in 1982 a celebrated member was so enthusiastic that he dyed and permed his hair before auditioning for the part of Curly. So dark and curly in fact that at a Round Table meeting the following night it was suggested that he should audition for his picture to appear on Robertson's jam! he got the part.



Clive BUIGESS: Clive returns to WOS after a two year break and takes on the role of Jud, a character he came to know when endlessly playing "Oklahoma!", the very first LP his parents bought way back in the "distant past". This is Clive's first venture into the world of musicals and he is thoroughly enjoying the new challenges which are a far cry from his earlier stage experiences in Shakespeare with the Garsington Players and his more recent role as Captain Zuniga in WOS's award-winning production of "Carmen".

SUZANNE Hall: This is Suzanne's 2nd production for WOS having previously appeared as Adelaide in the award winning "Guys & Dolls". She also regularly performs with West Meon Players with whom she recently directed "Stepping Out". In real life Suzanne didn't end up with a peddler or a cowboy She married a farmer!

Dan Hickson: This is Dan's 10th show since joining the society in 1992 and as far as he can recall it's the first time he has been called upon to rope spin. Fortunately the fear of this is taking his mind off the tap dancing. Previous principal parts have included Sky in "Guys & Dolls", Gabriel Eisenstein in "Die Fledermaus" and Frederick in "Pirates of Penzance". Dan also sings with Southern Eclectic and has performed oratorio solos including Britten's St. Nicolas, Handel's Messiah and Steiner's Crucifixion.

Clive Hilton: "Oklahoma!" is Clive's 32nd show with WOS. Most recently he played Samuel in "The Pirates of Penzance", Arvide in "Guys and Dolls" and Sir Despard in "Ruddigore". By now, he is getting used to playing fathers, uncles and even grandfathers, and is enjoying trying to stage a shotgun wedding in "Oklahoma!" as Ado Annie's father. Clive is also a member of the vocal ensemble Southern Eclectic and is a guest soloist with several choral societies.

Sharon Kendrick: Playing an eighteen year old slapper was always going to be a challenge, but Sharon is determined to make the part of Gertie Cummins "jist" right! Miss Kendrick is looking forward to the show transferring to the West End, and having her dressing room heaped with bouquets (well, what is acting about - if not complete fantasy?!).

Katie Moffitt: Katie is looking forward to her fourth show with WOS. Having played a naïve young girl in "Ruddigore", a worldly-wise showgirl in "Guys and Dolls" and an artless Cornish lass in "The Pirates of Penzance", she hopes to widen her repertoire with naïve, artless but increasingly worldly-wise Laurey...! She claims to find the stroppy side of Laurey a challenge to portray – though perhaps those who know her will find this hard to believe.

COLIN PAICE: Ali Hakim is the nadir of characters that Colin has played so far. From Lord Battersby, Count Kareska, the Judge in "Trial by Jury", a Major General, an incompetent lawyer in "Die Fledermaus" and Mine Host of the Garter in "The Merry Wives of Windsor", he has descended to a dodgy dealer whose aims in life are to make a fast buck, enjoy the company of women and to avoid fathers with shotguns.

Liz Petley-Jones: Liz has played, a variety of leading roles with WOS. Starting with Ado Annie in the society's last production of "Oklahoma!" she has worked her way through Eliza Doolittle, Calamity Jane and Dolly in "Hello, Dolly!" She has also performed in many Gilbert and Sullivan operettas and, when not on stage, is happy to do the make up. Liz has also performed with the Chesil Theatre for many years, recently appearing at the Theatre Royal as Mrs Hardcastle in "She Stoops to Conquer".

ICIN STEEL: This is lain's third "Oklahoma!" having first played the part of Curly 10 years ago (when he admits that he was a lot slimmer!) He has once more dusted off his cowboy boots and Stetson to join in the hoe-down for one of his favourite song and dance shows. Having played the Pirate King (including beard growing) and now Curly back to back, lain will be having a break from shows for a while to concentrate more on his family and newly reopened family business. 
