KEY FIGURES FROM THE GREAT WAR



Kaiser Wilhelm II
(1859-1941)

Queen Victoria's first grandson. Overtly militaristic, he wanted to increase Germany's military strength. He said that the war would never have happened had Victoria been on the throne. He tried in vain to scale back the offensive in Serbia. Apparently Queen Victoria died in his arms.



Franz Ferdinand
(1863-1914)

Proud and boastful, not overly cultured and bad tempered, he was not a popular leader. His assassination gave Austria-Hungary an excuse to attack Serbia. The situation escalated involving the major European powers because of powerful alliances that they had struck with each other.



Sir Douglas Haig
(1861-1928)

A somewhat controversial war general who apparently said, "The machine gun is a much over-rated weapon." His 1st Army Corps served well at Mons and at First Ypres. In 1918 Haig oversaw the successful British advances on the Western Front which led to victory for the Allies.



Sir John French
(1852-1925)

Commanded the British Expeditionary Force in 1914. Concerned about the troops welfare he had to be urged by Kitchener to stiffen his resolve. When succeeded by Haig, French commanded the British Home Forces until 1918, including dealing with the Irish uprising.



Charles Lanrezac
(1852-1925)


Caustic, bad tempered and blunt, only his brilliance and logic kept him employed. Poor communication led to confusion in his dealings with the British Expeditionary Force. He was scathing of Sir John French.



Mrs Pankhurst
(1858-1928)

Emmeline Pankhurst fought for women's suffrage for 25 years using militant tactics like arson. She was jailed seven times and participated in hunger strikes. In WW1, she urged men to volunteer for the front and women to do the jobs they left.

Suzanne studied Drama and Education at King Alfred's College in Winchester, leaving her home town of Ilfracombe where she had been dancing and singing on stage since she was three years old. She has been a member of WMOS for 15 years and in that time has taken various roles on and off stage: Director and Choreographer (Pajama Game, Billy), Oklahoma, La Vie Parisienne, Kiss Me Kate (Choreographer) Ado Annie (Oklahoma), Miss Adelaide (Guys and Dolls) Erma (Anything Goes), Maggie (42nd Street), Liz Imbrie (High Society). Suzanne also performs and directs with West Meon Theatre notably as Landlady in 'Two', Helen in 'Dark Earth and the Light Sky' and part of the ensemble cast of 'Cider with Rosie'. She runs a Bed and Breakfast in her Farmhouse where her husband farms, her three children run amok and the chickens produce beautiful free range eggs.

PETER (THEO) THEOBALD - MUSICAL DIRECTOR

Theo is a retired Primary School teacher. During his time teaching he wrote original music for 37 Christmas Plays. He is Musical Director with West Meon Theatre where he has composed and arranged original music for A Midsummer Night's Dream, Twelfth Night, Alice, Calendar Girls, As you Like it, Dark Earth and the Light Sky and Cider with Rosie which won the Curtain Call Award for Production of the year. Theo plays the keyboard and brass in Bursledon Village Band and the Euphonium in Thornden Community Wind Band. This is his first production with WMOS. In his spare time he can be found on the golf course.



DIRECTOR'S NOTES

This had been an incredibly exciting piece of theatre to work on with a very talented cast. Oh What A Lovely War requires an acting style which is movement based and it demands a flexible technique in any performer given the multiplicity of roles he/she is required to play. In this show there are no 'stars', but a committed ensemble who work together to create their own story.

The production style of Oh What A Lovely War is rooted in the tradition of British Music Hall so this is where we started. We created a troupe of players who would have toured the country, perhaps performing in Theatres like this one, bringing with them their set, costumes and props, entertaining all ages and classes with their universal story of war. The musicians travel with them, playing in the pit, and are very much part of the company. We use hats, jackets and accessories to tell the story, not to give an accurate representation of military and home life in 1914. Since the first production in 1964 there have been great advances in screen projection but we are using the original images and have kept the projection simple as the scenes, songs and pictures are balanced beautifully; nothing else is needed.

At the start, the stage is bare, and the show is created as you watch, at the end the stage is bare again, the show is over, a time for reflection.

CAST LINKS WITH WORLD WAR 1



Lucy's Great Grandfather, Hugh James Mouland, survived despite being gassed in the trenches near Ypres.



Hamish's Great Uncle, George Arthur Bailey was killed, aged 37, on the first day of the Battle of the Somme. Apparently his sister, Hamish's grandmother, was secretly pleased because he used to bully her!



Peter's maternal grandfather, Brian Linton Oxley survived the war. His picture shows the ribbons from the three medals which were awarded to all those who served. Top: 1914-15 Star Middle: British War Medal Bottom: 1914-18 Victory Medal They were known affectionately as Pip Squeak and Wilfred after the characters in a Daily Mail comic strip.

Liz's father remembered being told to stand on the doorstep to meet his father, Jesse Arthur Chapman, for the first time. He had been born while Jesse was serving on the Russian Front in Archangel.



Stephen's grandfather, Lance Corporal Stanley Meyrick Gosling was a rifleman with the Royal Welsh Fusiliers, 11th Battalion. He served in what became known as "The Forgotten Army" in Macedonia fighting against the Austrians, Bulgarians and Germans. He survived the war. The winters were particularly harsh. He wrote in his diary - 'Heavy snow and blowing a blizzard...our hands and feet cold and absolutely beyond feeling...how we are going to face it, I don't know. Gave 15 cigarettes for a biscuit. I never knew what it was to want at home'.



Frederick William Gleed, Stephen's other grandfather, saw action at the Battle of the Somme. As an engineer, one of his tasks was to crawl out at night into no-man's land to lay white tape on the ground, which led to wire that had been cut for a dawn attack the next day. This was so that in heavy smoke soldiers could look at the ground and still find their way to the holes in the wire. During one of his times as a 'runner', he came across a wounded German, Fritz Biestedt, and carried him back to British lines. The German was grateful and gave my grandfather his medals which included the Iron Cross. Sadly Fritz died 3 days later. Frederick survived the war.

Suzanne Hall's, Great Great Uncle Alfred Price, played his own part in cracking relations between Britain and Germany... ACCORDING to a report in the Ilfracombe Chronicle of September 12, 1914, when 19-year-old Prince Frederic William of Prussia (later Kaiser Bill) was on holiday in Ilfracombe in August 1878, he enjoyed a daily dip at Rapparee beach. One day, though, feeling a bit bored after his swim, he looked around for something else to do. The prince picked up a stone and hurled it at one of the numbers adorning a row of changing booths. Finding this a fun way to pass the time, he continued to throw stones at the huts. Worried about the abuse of his father's property, the beach attendant's son, Alf Price, decided to go and sort the visitor out. Apparently, when Alf told the future Kaiser to stop throwing stones, the regal visitor retorted: "Do you know who I am?" Alf obviously didn't. Or he decided to take the risk of saying he didn't care who the stone thrower was. The young prince then landed Alf a hard blow on the right jaw. The punch caught Alf by surprise and he fell on to the sands. Alf, 16, then got up and started to fight the prince. The brawl, apparently, lasted around 20 minutes. The prince's tutor and entourage, who had been exploring the neighbourhood, returned and were horrified by the sight of the two lads going at each other hammer and tongs. The tutor pulled them apart. At the time the incident was hushed up but, during the First World War, a poem written by W H Coates about the incident was sent to North Devon lads fighting at the front. Money raised from the sale of the poem locally went to war charities.

OH WHAT A LOVELY WAR - 1974

Winchester Dramatic Society from the Chesil Theatre presented Oh What a Lovely War in July 1974 in the octagonal former water storage tower at the Tower Arts Centre, here in Winchester.

The audience sat on either side of a central acting area, with an entrance for actors at each end. The band with keyboard, flute, clarinet and percussion was placed at one end, with the screen for projection of news flashes and photographs above. The stage floor level was varied by low movable platforms to represent trenches, etc. There was no conductor, and the actors took their musical cues from the band. The cast of ten men and ten girls included Liz Petley Jones, now performing again, forty years on!



The play was directed by Geoffrey Burnaby, also responsible for our own Fiddler on the Roof in 1993 and Carmen in 2000. Geoffrey wrote a programme note in which he emphasised the hybrid nature of the show, ending with the words "We hope that you will return home informed, perhaps a little chastened, but above all entertained".
