New York 1959

Theatre Producer Max Bialystock's latest musical is a huge flop and closes on opening night. He finances his musicals by sleeping with old ladies so wants to find a sure-fire way of making money. The accountant Leo Bloom notices that more money could be made from a flop than from a hit and after much persuasion, Leo agrees to become A Producer with the following plan:

Step 1: Find the worst play ever written.

Step 2: Hire the worst director in town.

Step 3: Raise two million dollars. ... One each (There's a lot of little old ladies out there!)

Step 4: Hire the worst actors in New York and

open on Broadway

Step 5: Close on Broadway, take the two million,

and go to Rio.

Max and Leo choose the play Springtime for Hitler, written by the German Franz Liebkind and hire the director Roger DeBris who decides the show needs to be more....GAY. With Ulla (the Swedish herring-loving actress) on board all is set for a gigantic Broadway flop.....

But wait, there are guns, and policemen, and prisons, and broken legs and broken dreams.



Mel Brooks

My message to the world is "Let's swing, sing, shout, make noise! Let's not mimic death before our time "!comes! Let's be wet and noisy

Mel Brooks, the writer of *The Producers*, is one of America's most prolific writers and directors with a career spanning over seven decades.

In 2001, having previously won an Emmy, a Grammy and an Oscar, he joined a small list of EGOT winners with his Tony Award wins for *The Producers*.

Brooks was born on a tenement kitchen table, in 1926, in Brooklyn, New York City. His father's family were Jewish people from Gdańsk, Poland; his mother's family were Jews from Kyiv. His father died at 34 when Brooks was two years old.

At age nine, he went to a Broadway show with his Uncle Joe—a taxi driver who drove the Broadway doormen back to Brooklyn for free and was given the tickets in gratitude—and saw Anything Goes with Ethel Merman at the Alvin Theatre. After the show, he told his uncle that he was not going to work in the garment district like everyone else but was absolutely going into show business.

When Mel Brooks was 18 he joined the United States Army and was sent to Europe in 1944 to aid the allies in their fight against the Nazis. Here, he saw first hand the devastation caused by Hitler's army.

'More than anything the Holocaust by the Nazis is probably the great outrage of the 20th century. I was never crazy about Hitler ... If you trade rhetoric with a dictator you never win ... That's what they do so well: they seduce people. If I get on the soapbox and wax eloquently, it'll be blown away in the wind, but if I do Springtime for Hitler it'll never be forgotten. ... if you ridicule them, bring them down with laughter, they can't win. You show how crazy they are....'

On returning from the war, Brooks began working as a drummer and a pianist in nightclubs. Then, as if from a movie plot, one night a regular comic at one of the clubs was too sick to perform, so Brooks started working as a stand-up comic, telling jokes and doing movie-star impressions. A star was born.

At the opening of the Broadway version of "The Producers", he was asked by a reporter if he was nervous about the play's reception, since it cost \$40 million to produce. Brooks joked, "If it flops, I'll take the other sixty million and fly to Rio." He did not have to worry, since the play was a smash hit, both a critical and financial success.


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Our Mission

Supports the needs of youth and adult theatre, on and off stage

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
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
