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an operetta by Edward German with lyrics by Basil Hood in an enhanced concert version

Edward German's patriotic pageant reveals the love and rivalries at the court of Queen Elizabeth I, a monarch consumed with jealousy over Walter Raleigh's attentions to Bessie Throckmorton, information she has gained from the Earl of Essex. It perpetuates the fiction that the England of Good Queen Bess was actually merry. It includes much delightful music including *O peaceful England* and *The Yeoman of England*. The work established German as a possible successor to Arthur Sullivan.

Merrie England was my first production with WOS and I recall dancing on the Guildhall stage dressed all in green with a wicker waste paper basket on my head draped in green streamers. Brian Hurst was Bill or Ben (not one of the flower pot men!) and the late Dorothy Crosby was an imposing and authoritative Queen Elizabeth.

I hope you enjoy this departure from our usual productions which has enabled all our members to take part without the usual restrictions of "space on the stage".

SYNOPSIS:

The young Earl of Essex wants to gain the aging Queen Elizabeth's favour, in place of Sir Walter Raleigh, with whom she has been flirting. Raleigh has fallen in love with Bessie Throckmorton, the Queen's maid of honour, but they dare not declare their love in public. Raleigh has written a love-letter to Bessie, but she has lost it, and it has been found by Jill-All-Alone, a gypsy. Jill is accused of witchcraft, and she seeks the protection of Essex, who on reading the letter and realising how he can use it, agrees to help Jill. He shows the letter to the Queen, and in a fit of jealousy she orders Raleigh's banishment from Court, Bessie's imprisonment and Jill's execution as a witch.

Now that he has replaced Raleigh in the Queen's favour, Essex decides to try to repair the damage he has caused. Playing on the Queen's superstitions, he arranges for the appearance before Elizabeth of a Forester dressed as the mythical hunter Herne (as impersonated by Falstaff in *The Merry Wives of Windsor*). Essex tells the Queen that Herne only appears when the monarch is contemplating committing a crime. To help with the deception everybody else denies seeing Herne. The gullible Queen is taken in, relents and pardons Raleigh, Bessie and Jill, and the operetta ends with a short masque of Robin Hood and Maid Marion.

THE LEGEND OF HERNE THE HUNTER AND HERNES DAIL

Medieval Europe was full of legends of a wild huntsman who frequented certain forests with a pack of spectral hounds. A notable English version tells of Herne the Hunter, one time Keeper in Windsor Forest, who according to Shakespeare walks in wintertime about midnight, blasts trees and takes cattle. He wears horns and rattles a chain. An oak in Windsor Great Park, blown down in 1863 and replanted by Queen Victoria, was reputed to be haunted by Herne.

Basil Hood adapts the Herne legend by creating a secret tunnel from Windsor Castle to Herne's Oak, and supposing that Henry VIII made use of the tunnel en route to his romantic rendez-vous. Jill-All-Alone says that the King disguised himself with deerskin, stag horns and carried a hunting horn to put snoopers off the scent. Fifty years after Henry's death these props are apparently still hanging inside the mouth of the tunnel!
