

Musical Director David Howells are rightly given credit in this programme for the essential part they play in the Society's success.



#### RICKY PRICE

Producer

Ricky initially trained as an actor at Liverpool, gaining experience there and at Southport in repertory. He then trained for three years as a dancer in classical and modern ballet, and musical comedy, including one year with Ballet Rambert. He toured as a dancer and singer in Zip Goes a Million, and also toured as half of a dance duo in variety and cabaret, part choreographing the act, too. From 1959 to 1972 he worked with Sadler's Wells Opera Company at that theatre and the Coliseum as a dancer, ballet master and eventual staff producer. During breaks from the company he worked as a dancer and singer in

various revue and summer seasons (also as a choreographer), and toured in My Fair Lady, Robert and Elizabeth (also as ballet master), Hello Dolly and No, No, Nanette. He appeared several times in TV dance spectaculars and operetta. Since 1972 he has been directing and choreographing all types of musical theatre with amateur musical societies, including the British amateur première of Gigi in Norwich and Jesus Christ Superstar in Bermuda. He has been a senior producer at the NODA Summer School for eleven years, and an adjudicator at the Waterford International Festival of Light Opera in 1984 and 1985. Recent productions include Oklahoma! at Bournemouth, Carmen at Weymouth, The Pajama Game and Kiss Me Kate at Oxford. Future plans include Half a Sixpence at Southampton and the Weymouth Junior Section, Mame at Weymouth, Annie at Frome, La Vie Parisienne in Portsmouth, a new and yet unnamed McKenna musical (composer of On the Rialto) in 1990 with a professional cast, and the Sound of Music in Bournemouth.



#### **DAVID HOWELLS**

Musical Director

David was born in the Swansea Valley in 1957, thereby ensuring that his musical career started at an early age. He started conducting whilst studying in Winchester for his B.Ed. degree in Music. He formed Yately Choral Society in 1979 and under his directorship it flourished into the successful society it is today. He retained his Winchester connections through his role as Musical Director for WAOS shows such as The Gondoliers and Oklahoma!. He has directed music for Thames Television and has conducted the Savoy Singers in Camberley. Despite playing the violin in many orchestras, his lifetime ambition of

conducting an orchestral concert was not fulfilled until 1987. He runs a furniture removal business and is a fanatical rugby fan, supporting Wales, of course!



#### LIZ PETLEY-JONES Calamity Jane

After training as a teacher at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, Liz moved to Hampshire in 1968 and joined the Winchester Dramatic Society in 1971. Rôles with WDS range from Aladdin to Viola in Twelfth Night. However the combination of comedy, acting and singing lured her to WAOS in 1980. Since then she has played various rôles in The Sorcerer, Free as Air, Ruddigore, Patience and the Howells/Price production of Oklahoma! — as Ado Annie, and My Fair Lady — as Eliza. Liz also appeared in Ricky Price's production of McKenna & Brown's On the Rialto as Portia. Now teaching full time and with two children, Calamity Jane is undoubtedly Liz's most demanding rôle. Ricky Price's production has reached parts she didn't know she had!



#### PENNY BULLOUGH Katie Brown

Penny's interest in amateur singing developed whilst a student, when she was a member of the Bulmershe Folk Choir. This group had an international reputation and sang in concerts and festivals in Britain and Europe. During the same period, Penny sang in the College Light Operatic Society, taking roles in Gilbert and Sullivan and musicals. In the following years Penny was involved in choral music, not returning to the amateur stage until 1986, with the Farnborough RAE Operatic Society. On moving to Winchester last year she joined WAOS, taking the title rôle in *Patience*.



#### **JENNY DICKINSON** Susan

Made her debut as a Munchkin, aged five, and never looked back since. Previous appearances at the Theatre Royal in *Wild Oats* and as a dancer in *On the Rialto*. As a member of Winchester Dramatic Society, she has appeared in *Alfie, Dusa, Fish, Stas and Vi* and most recently *The House of Bernarda Alba* at the Chesil Theatre. This is her first production with the WAOS.



#### SHEILA STILING Adelaide Adams

Sheila has been treading the boards in Winchester for some years, but began as a professional dancer, appearing in the Hollywood epic *El Cid.* For quite a few seasons she was Principal Girl in the Dramatic Society's annual pantomime, and as you can imagine always ended up with her Prince Charming. She has been a member of the Operatic Society for ten years, and has taken many leading rôles, incuding Laurie in *Oklahoma!*. Her dancing skills are always put to good use as a choreographer, but this year marks her debut as a producer's assistant.



#### CHRIS READ Wild Bill Hickok

Chris Read was born in Cheshire at an early age. Quickly acquiring an enthusiasm for things theatrical, his subsequent career has taken him from second sheep in the infant school nativity play to his present role as Wild Bill Hickok. The intervening years have been sprinkled with a variety of parts ranging from a Nibelung to Nanki Poo. In 1986 he and his wife moved to Winchester and it was not long before he joined WAOS with whom he has since appeared in Gilbert and Sullivan's *lolanthe* and *Patience*. A keen singer, he has performed with a number of choirs and even spent a short period singing with a rock n' roll band. Off the stage he is rumoured to be a local solicitor.



#### **COLIN THOMAS** Danny


Colin's first stage appearance was as a genie in *The Marriage of Figaro* at the tender age of 13. After this 'spirited' start, he was Stephen of Cloys in *The Children's Crusade*, where he led the children to the Holy Land. At 17 he appeared in an amateur *Black and White Minstrel Show* in Sheffield, and also choreographed his own tap dance routine in the Newark panto *Dick Whittington*. Colin sings with the Richeldis Choir who hails from his home village of Walsingham in Norfolk. They have sung throughout Norfolk and at Westminster and Lichfield cathedrals. His previous appearances with WAOS was as Albert in *Free as Air*; since then he has been resting on his laurels until the present show. When not singing, Colin spends his time enjoying competitive sports; he is a piano tuner by profession and is eagerly awaiting your call about pianos which

need tuning badly! (Chandlers Ford 255017).



#### MARTIN LARCOMBE Francis Fryer

If Martin could have one wish come true, it would be to sing like Howard Keel. In the meantime he enjoys comedy rôles, whether in plays, operetta, musicals or pantomime. He started his present existence in the back row of the WAOS chorus, and has since taken various rôles such as Bunthorne in *Patience*. He enjoys playing character parts while waiting for his dream to come true.



#### FRED SHARPLES Henry Miller

At Cambridge, where he took his degree, Fred acted with the Marlowe Society and the ADC. He was also a member of the Emmanuel Singers. He says he is a sucker for musicals, but has done most of his theatre work in plays. His many leading rôles have included Charles in Blithe Spirit, Gary in Present Laughter, Henry II in The Lion in Winter, Haig in Oh! What a Lovely War and, in Shakespeare, Prospero and King Lear. Last year he played Becket in Murder in the Cathedral at Alton under the direction of Patrick Standford, now director of the Nuffield Theatre. As a producer his work has included Chekhov's Three Sisters and Uncle Vanya, the Restoration comedy The Country Wife and She Stoops to Conquer at the Chesil Theatre, Winchester. Earlier this year he produced Alan Bennett's Habeas Corpus with the Alton Fringe Theatre. He has been a member of the Operatic Society

some 15 years, appearing in productions of *The Mikado* and *Palience* during the seventies and compered the concerts. He last appeared with the Society as Colonel Pickering in *My Fair Lady*.



#### FRED CORTON Rattlesake

After many years as part of the audience, Fred Corton joined the company of *The Yeomen of the Guard* in 1979 as the Headman. Since then he has perfected his portrayal of spear carrier/barmen. Rattlesnake marks a new step in his acting career.



#### COLIN PAICE Joe

Colin is well cast in his rôle as Joe the barman, as he is often seen serving behind the bar of the Chesil Theatre. In the last few years Colin has played Terry in Alan Ayckbourn's Confusions at the Chesil, filled in as Fil-lin in the Shawford pantomime and was noted for doing the splits as the Major in the WAOS's Patience last year. As well as performing on the stage he has been involved with other shows backstage. During Faust last year he gained fame when he made a one-off appearance as the Caterpillar.



#### RON STAINER Doc Pierce

Ron joined the WAOS as a singer and acting member for the 1958 production of *Utopia Ltd*, the first time that this opera had been staged by WAOS since 1931. At that time it was not in the D'Oyly Carte repertoire and consequently we received a visit from their director at our matinée. *Calamity Jane* is Ron's fifteenth production in which he has sung bass, baritone or tenor in the chorus. In addition he has taken part in a varied range of singing in most of the Society's concerts. Ron is currently singing with the Musetta Singers and has recently sung with a local barber shop quartet. He also spent over forty years singing for the Holy Trinity Church Choir and the Winchester City Choir. Even earlier he sang with the now defunct Brooks Choir. Music has always been Ron's main hobby; others include badminton, swimming and walking.



#### PHILIP GEBBETT Hank

Philip is a bit of a mystery man, especially as he was too modest to submit a CV to the programme editor. One could, perhaps, speculate as to hidden talents, favourite sports and an exciting job in the City selling shares, but the result might steal the thunder from Stewarts CV. Perhaps the thrill of being in his first WAOS show might prompt him to stay on for future productions, when at least the programme editor could write 'Starred as Hank in *Calamity Jane* last year'.





This production sees him make one of his rare stage appearances. It is hard to forget the intensity of his performance during the production of *The Nativity* presented by Class IIIb of Costessey Junior School where his sensitive portrayal of Shepherd #2 set a *beau ideal* for the industry. More recently, he has shown his flexibility by giving a virtuoso performance conducting the Bartok Triptych at the Festival Hall with the Welsh National Choir. Also, in *The Bacchae*, a Euripides tragedy about the frenzied female cult of Dionysus, the combination of idolatry and savagery lent a contrasting backdrop to his interpretation of Dirty Den. Eschewing his duties as the Director of the Philharmonic and the President of the National Theatre temporarily, he has recently been touring with his sell-out one-man show *A Night With Dave Allen*. Somehow, he finds time for an active social

life, and enjoys many trendy sports including windsurfing, bodybuilding and skiing. He claims to work part time as a computer consultant, and his analyst says that with time and the right tablets, the illusions of grandeur will fade.



#### **DICK TROWER** Colonel

Dick Trower joined the Society in 1957 and has yet to miss a show or concert. He served on the committee for over 25 years in which time he has enjoyed three spells as chairman, seven years as secretary and has, most years, been actively engaged in publicity and set construction. On stage he has had several major principal rôles and many minor rôles. Usually, these days, he is found in the chorus. He was made an Honorary Life Member in 1979 and is also a Vice-President of the Society. For over ten years Dick has taken a keen interest in the National Operatic and Dramatic Association, and for the last five years he has held the position of Southern Area Councillor, looking after the interests of over 120 societies.

#### **CALAMITY JANE AND DORIS DAY**

Mention Calamity Jane and most people will think of Doris Day. Recently she gave an interview for BBC TV in which she reviewed her career in films. Her verdict on Calamity?

'I loved it - the real me!'

She described it as a 'wild movie', and Calamity as 'noisy, roughhouse, always wanting to be heard'. Like many of our cast, the music is at a lower pitch than her usual singing voice, and so she had to lower the voice, roughening it and giving it a country twang to get Calamity to shine through.

The famous song 'My Secret Love' holds a secret all of its own. Used to singing live with a band, and having little patience with the film technique of recording many 'takes' and splicing the best bits together, Doris Day suggested that the orchestra attempt a take of 'Secret Love' right at the start of the planned three-hour session. She had followed her usual routine, having rehearsed in the morning, eaten a hearty lunch, rested the voice, and then cycled to the studio. At 1pm the orchestra struck up the opening strains of this lovely song. Within three minutes, the perfect take was recorded and 'in the can', and within four minutes Doris Day was cycling home again!


