HMS Pinafore—Plot Synopsis



ACT 1: The Pinafore, a beauty of a ship in Her Majesty's navy is anchored in the harbour at Portsmouth. Its

starry-eyed

sailors are busy preparing for the expected arrival of Sir Joseph Porter, K.C.B., Britain's First Lord of the Admiralty. "Little Buttercup" comes aboard to sell her stock of luxuries to the sailors.

Common sailor, Ralph, tells his

messmates that he is in love with the Captain's daughter, Josephine. Dick Deadeye reminds the





seaman that Captain's daughters don't marry foremast hands! The Captain arrives to inspect his crew.

Josephine is sought in marriage by Sir Joseph, but secretly, she is in love with lowly sailor Ralph. It also seems that Little Buttercup has a romantic interest in the Captain and harbours a secret about Ralph....

Sir Joseph arrives attended by his many 'sisters and his cousins and his aunts' to discuss the proposed marriage.

Ralph declares his love for Josephine and his willingness to try to fit in with

middle-class society. She rejects him, she cannot forget the disparity in their ranks. But when Ralph threatens to walk the plank, the lady relents and declares her love for him. The lovers plot to elope that very night. Dick Deadeye warns the pair of the impropriety of their plan, but he is forced to retreat.





ACT 2: Captain Corcoran sings to the moon of his troubles. Little Buttercup comes to him and reveals her affection. He tells her that because of his rank he can never be more to her than a friend; but she hints darkly that a change is in store for him.

Sir Joseph complains that Josephine does not favour his suit. The Captain suggests that she is dazzled by his lofty station and he should plead his cause on the ground that "love levels all ranks". When Josephine hears this argument, she considers how eloquently Sir Joseph has stated the justification for her to marry Ralph!





Dick Deadeye reveals the planned elopement. He and the Captain lie in wait for the crew. The Captain confronts the elopers and is

so exasperated that he actually swears a foul oath, "Damme it!". Sir Joseph Porter orders the Captain to go to his cabin for this "ill-advised asperity."

Sir Joseph finds out that Ralph and Josephine love one another but affairs are interrupted by Little Buttercup, who discloses her long-concealed secret: as their foster mother, she had

exchanged the Captain and Ralph while they were both babies.

Sir Joseph immediately sends for Ralph (who is now Captain) and the Captain (who is now a humble seaman). Since it is "out of the question" for Sir Joseph to marry the daughter of a mere sailor, his Lordship nobly consents to the marriage of Ralph and Josephine. The former Captain is now free to marry dear Little Buttercup, and Sir



Joseph agrees to marry cousin Hebe. All ends with "joy and rapture unforeseen," for "he is an Englishman!" **Hip, Hip, Hooray!**

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
Katie Hickson—Buttercup


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


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WMOS sets sail on another voyage aboard the Pinafore.

OUR NEW 'FIRST LORD' AI SEA. Average forwarders and the set of th

First performed by WMOS at the Winchester Guildhall in 1925, H.M.S. Pinafore (or The Lass That Loved a Sailor) is Gilbert and Sullivan's fourth collaboration, which arrived hot on the heels of Thespis, Trial by Jury and The Sorcerer. The story of the lowly sailor, Ralph, and his love for the lofty Captain's daughter, Josephine, H.M.S. Pinafore was a commercial success both in London (running for 571 performances at the Opera Comique in 1878, making it, at the time, the second-longest theatrical run in history), and also internationally, with hundreds of unlicensed performances which played all over America. The initial run was not without its hurdles. When the show first opened, ticket sales were poor due to a heat wave (let's hope we don't suffer the same fate!). But, as the weather cooled, and several promenade concerts in Covent Garden were organised to generate publicity, by September, the show was playing to sell-out audiences.

Like most G&S operettas, Pinafore holds a mirror to society, with themes of social class, snobbery, and politics. The pair were also not shy of mocking real-life people – one well-known example can be found in the character of Sir Joseph Porter, the First Lord of the Admiralty, who was said to have been modelled on William Henry Smith, a Conservative politician, and bookseller and newsagent for his family's business, WH Smith, whom, without any naval experience, was made First Lord of the Admiralty. As a result, William would be known for the rest of his career as 'Pinafore Smith' – even by former Prime Minister, Benjamin Disraeli, who had given Smith the naval title in the year before Pinafore opened.

According to the journalist Gary Dexter, writing for The Telegraph in 2008, not only did William Henry Smith become an unwitting muse for the character of Sir Joseph, but the name of the operetta itself. Originally titled *H.M.S. Semaphore*, a name Gilbert admitted in 1880 that was 'suggested entirely by rhyme ... something had to rhyme with three cheers more', but due to Semaphore not being very funny, it was Sullivan's suggestion to change the name to Pinafore – another dig at the nautical novice, Smith, 'tied by his apron-strings' to dry land.

Drawing on inspiration from both his father's career as a naval surgeon, and a collection of poems titled 'Bab Ballad' that he had written earlier in his career, most of which had a nautical theme, W.S. Gilbert, the show's librettist, was interested by the idea of a nautical theme for the opera. Some of the characters in his poems also found iterations of themselves in Pinafore – Dick Deadeve is based on a character that can be found lurking in 'Woman's Gratitude' (1869), Little Buttercup appears (almost identically) in 'The Bumboat Woman's Story' (1870), and even a version of our lovesick Ralph Rackstraw can be found in the words of 'Joe Go-Lightly' (1867). In late 1877, whilst Sullivan was away on holiday, Gilbert sent his collaborating partner a plot outline for Pinafore, along with the accompanying note:

I have very little doubt whatever but that you will be pleased with it. ... there is a good deal of fun in it which I haven't set down on paper. Among other things a song (a kind of 'Judge's Song') for the First Lord – tracing his career as office -boy ... clerk, traveller, junior partner and First Lord of Britain's Navy. ... Of course there will be no personality in this – the fact that the First Lord in the Opera is a Radical of the most pronounced type will do away with any suspicion that W. H. Smith is intended.

The music from Pinafore has also made its way into popular culture, from films including Raiders of the Lost Ark and The Hand that Rocks the Cradle, to TV shows like The West Wing, Family Guy and The Simpsons, with the iconic scene where Bart asks Sideshow Bob to perform the entire show as a last request to delay Sideshow Bob killing him




