Christian Counselling Service

We are a local chality registered in 1996, with the purpose of providing counselling to the over 18's in Winchester and the surrounding area.

Our services are offered to the whole community regardless of financial situation. Many of our clients are able to make a donation towards our running costs, however we do have some who are on low income or benefits and cannot afford anything other than a nominal contribution. Without generous donations from grants, local Churches and other organizations we would not be able to offer this service.

Over the past year The Olive Branch has worked with over 600 clients. We have 45 professionally trained volunteer counsellors. Many of our clients present issues such as anxiety, depression and a range of relationship issues which may include bereavement, separation and domestic violence. We also provide counselling to clients living with more severe mental health issues.

In evaluating the outcomes of our counselling, it suggests that with our support the majority of our clients are better able to manage their day-today lives, for example by returning to work. For some of our clients, counselling can literally be life-saving.

# What's the Story..?

When the latest actress turns out to be a man, Francis Fryer, Miller's misguided decision to get him to perform in drag backfires and Calamity vows to save the day by fetching from Chicago the men's 'cigareet card' heart-throb, Adelaide Adams.

By mistakenly fetching Katie Brown, Adelaide's dresser, Calamity ruins her own chances of winning the heart of the dashing 'Lootenant' Danny Gilmartin.

# Liz Petley-Jones-Director

Liz trained as a teacher at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and taught in secondary and primary schools in Hampshire till her retirement in 2006. She has performed in Winchester since 1971 with the Chesil Theatre and joined WOS/WMOS in 1975 when she was in the chorus of *Patience*. Many principal roles followed including Eliza in *My Fair Lady*, Golde in *Fiddler on the Roof*, Dolly in *Hello*, *Dolly!* and Calamity in WOS's 1989 production of *Calamity Jane*. More recently the pinnacle of her singing and acting career was as Wall in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*! In 2014, Liz directed *High Society* for WMOS and is delighted to be directing Calamity Jane.

# Lucy Hutchings-Susa

Lucy lives in Winchester and is a primary school teacher. She studied Musical Theatre at University. This is her second show with WMOS having performed in last year's *The Witches of Eastwick* where she led the dancing devils. In her spare time she enjoys socialising with friends and fine dining in all the new restaurants in town.



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# Who was The Real

All that seems certain about Calamity Jane is that she was a mysterious person who created her own myth through exaggeration and lies.

She was born Martha Cannary in 1852 the oldest of six children to parents who were farmers and received little to no formal education and she was illiterate. Orphaned in 1866, she became the head of the family and took her siblings to Piedmont, Wyoming Territory, where she worked at various odd jobs in order to sustain the family.

Accounts from this period describe her as being "*extremely* attractive" and a "*pretty*, dark-eyed girl."

In 1874 she became a scout at Fort Russell, Wyoming Territory where she also became a part-time prostitute at the Fort Laramie Three-Mile Hog Ranch.



It was during this time that she received her nickname "Calamity Jane" when she rescued her post commander, one Captain Egan, from an Indian attack outside the post.

She was in Goose Creek, and Capt. Egan ordered the soldiers to "quell an uprising of the Indians."

At one point over the course of the battle, in which half a dozen soldiers were killed, the captain was shot while riding his horse toward the fort. Calamity galloped her horse to him, arriving in time to catch him as he was falling. She lifted him onto her horse and got him safely to the fort.

Supposedly on recovering, he laughingly said, "I name you Calamity Jane, the heroine of the plains."

In 1875 she accompanied the military-escorted Newton-Jenney Party, a scientific expedition, into the Black Hills of South Dakota to map the area. By this time her *beauty had all but vanished* and her skin was leathery and tanned from exposure to the Sun and wind, *she had become muscular and unfeminine*, and her hair was stringy and rarely washed.

# Calamity Jane?

A year later she settled in Deadwood, South Dakota, where she met "Wild Bill" Hickok and became obsessed with his personality and life. When Hickok was killed during a poker game on August 2, 1876, she claimed to have been married to him,

and he was the father of a child that she gave up for adoption. No official records exist proving either the marriage or birth and her romantic slant to their relationship was probably fabricated. She continued to live in Deadwood and performed other heroic acts, including nursing victims of a smallpox epidemic in late 1876 and the rescue of a stagecoach from an Indian attack where she took over the reins from the stagecoach driver who was killed in the attack and brought it safely to its destination at Deadwood. In 1893 she began appearing in Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show as a storyteller and in 1896 she joined the travelling Kohn and Middleton Dime Museum as a performer, appearing on stage in buckskins and reciting her adventures, which she embellished in great fashion, including the fabricated story that she served under Lieutenant Colonel Custer on several occasions. In 1901 she participated in the Pan-American Exposition in Buffalo, New York. By this time she had become an alcoholic and suffered from depression.

Before she died, she wrote a confession, stating that she had fibbed about her past life.

She died in 1903.
