The Story of the Opera



UR story opens with a distinctly mournful note. All the ladies, without exception, are hopelessly in love with the fleshly poet, Bunthorne, the weird apostle of crazy estheticism and exaggerated simplicity.

Even Lady Jane, the proud possessor of a "rugged old bosom," whatever that may mean, has succumbed to the charms of this attractive poet? and her discovery that he prefers to dangle after the village milkmaid, Patience, renders her almost speechless with fury and reduces her lady friends to a complete state of abject misery.

Bunthorne infinitely prefers his daily treat of fresh dairy butter in a tablespoon to Lady Jane's offer of her store of golden love.

The lovesick maidens are soon in a somewhat awkward position, for their old "flames," the 35th Dragoon Guards, once more appear upon the scene. They were all engaged to these gallant soldiers a year ago, and the men have arrived keenly anxious to meet their flancees and of course revive old memories of happy times spent in their company, even though a "year ago."

But to their horror and dismay Bunthorne the Poet reigns supreme for the time being in the hearts of their lady friends, and the "precious nonsense" of their æsthetic conversation soon reduces the officers to

a hopeless state of astonished bewilderment.

"You are not Della Cruscan! you are not even Early English," to Colonel Calverly of the Guards renders that gentleman practically speechless for a time, while Major Murgatroyd is highly incensed at the reflection on the King's uniform.

A tunic which possessed a "tender bloom like cold gravy," as portrayed by Lady Jane, has very few charms for him, and would

certainly not enhance his appearance "on parade."

Patience meanwhile, under the loving tuition of Lady Angela (an expert in love-making), discovers she must really see about loving someone in earnest. "It is her duty!"

She straightway falls in love with Grosvenor, a handsome stranger

who appears on the scene, and he with her.

He, wonderful to relate, turns out to be the "boy friend" of her childhood, her Archibald, and is possessed of a maddening beauty which causes every woman whom he meets to fall at his feet in adoration.

He, by his fatal gift, completely takes the "wind out of poor Bunthorne's sails," and his poetry (for he too is a poet) is far and

away more suited to the popular taste.

Bunthorne is very upset, but decides on a heroic course of action. He will, aided by his Solicitor, put himself up to be "raffled for." The tickets are at a premium, and Lady Jane is determined to secure the lucky one if possible.

Act II finds Lady Jane still true to her Reginald, and her lady companions one and all "carrying on" with the new man, Archibald, with great gusto. "Off with the old love and on with the new" is their guiding principle, until Grosvenor is at last compelled to plead for a little time off, just a half holiday in fact.

Meanwhile the soldiers are not letting the grass grow under their feet, and their efforts to become esthetical are infinitely pathetic.

The Colonel, the Duke and the Major take private lessons in

æsthetic deportment, with varying success.

Anyhow, they make a distinct impression and win back two of the ladies by their posing with the lily, and now it only remains for the Duke to choose his bride. Owing to his "1000 a day" income, a mad rush takes place, but his choice reveals his innate nobleness of character and incidentally the perversity of feminine human nature.

Everyone again secures a bride with the exception of Bunthorne,

who is cruelly left to console himself as before,

I shall have to be contented With a tulip or li-ly!"
